Do you get your care needs met by Home care or similar? Did you know that you can have money from Social Services instead of the more usual arrangement of a carer being sent to you? This money is called a **Direct Payment.** With this money you employ your own Personal Assistant to come to you when you want them to come. You will no longer have to sit around wondering IF they will turn up, WHEN they will turn up or WHO will turn up. You will be in control. You will make the decisions.
